We are born, we are given just so much food as will keep the breath in our bodies, and those of us who are capable of it are forced to work to the last atom of our strength; and the very instant that our usefulness has come to an end we are slaughtered with hideous cruelty. No animal in England knows the meaning of happiness or leisure after he is a year old. No animal in England is free. The life of an animal is misery and slavery: that is the plain truth.	Moses' statement makes me sympathetic to animals, inclined to be vegetarian. On a larger scale, what he's saying kind of applies to working class and poor people everywhere. Maybe they're not literally slaughtered, but they are oppressed in the ways Moses describes.
