Course Description/Overview

Welcome to English II! This course is intended to prepare you for English 12 and university-level course work, which requires a fundamental knowledge of literary technique, literary movements, and literary analysis and response. This course is also meant to introduce you to the literature and authors of the United States of America, pulled from a variety of genres and time periods. This course will also focus on developing your skills as writers, including building vocabulary and grammar knowledge. We will be writing as much and as often as we can. You will be expected to explore American literature in order to become more critical readers, writers, and thinkers. We will use literature and writing to better know ourselves and our country. Throughout this year, we will consider what reading and writing are good for.

Essential Topics/Questions

- What does it mean to be American?
- How has American literature benefited from the contributions of multiple ethnicities?
- What can you learn about values of people – various cultures and eras as well as your own – by studying the literature they produced?
- How did American authors develop their own voices?
- How can words and ideas be organized for the greatest rhetorical effect?
- How does a writer demonstrate sentence fluency?
- How can you incorporate ideas of others to create an original perspective on an issue?

Sometimes, time in class will be given to work on assignments. Please use this time wisely to complete work, or else the privilege of completing these tasks in class will be taken away. All work should include a complete heading and is due at the beginning of class on the due date. If you know in advance that you will be absent and unable to turn in an assignment, please let me know as soon as possible, so we can make alternative arrangements.
